Adopted from *The Lutheran Service Book* (p. 294)

October 20, 2024 A.D. The 22nd Sunday after Pentecost

This brief service is intended as a simple form of daily prayer for individuals and families. When more than one person is present, the Psalm and other parts of the service may be spoken responsively, with one person reading the words in regular type and the others responding with the words in bold type. The Creed and Prayers that are in bold type are to be said by all.

Invocation

From Psalm 34

The LORD is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit.

I will bless the LORD at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth.

I sought the LORD, and he answered me and delivered me from all my fears.

Scripture Lesson (Mark 10:23-31)

²³Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How difficult it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" ²⁴And the disciples were amazed at his words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how difficult it is to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." ²⁶And they were exceedingly astonished, and said to him, "Then who can be saved?" ²⁷Jesus looked at them and said, "With man it is impossible, but not with God. For all things are possible with God." ²⁸Peter began to say to him, "See, we have left everything and followed you." ²⁹Jesus said, "Truly, I say to you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children

or lands, for my sake and for the gospel, ³⁰who will not receive a hundredfold now in this time, houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and in the age to come eternal life. ³¹But many who are first will be last, and the last first."

Grace, mercy and peace to you from God – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

If any of us were to obtain a large sum of money, whether it be through the lottery, an inheritance, or maybe even earning it — we would tend to think that this would be an enormous blessing from God. But in our Scripture reading, Jesus gives us some insight concerning wealth that does not come from most people. Rather it comes from God, and as such it turns what many of us might think concerning not only wealth and riches, but also our standing before God and our salvation, upside down.

Looking at Mark 10:23-31, we remember that Jesus had just spoken to a rich young man. He had come to Jesus expecting some good advice from a wise teacher. However, Jesus tells him to sell everything he has and give it to the poor – demanding something beyond his ability to highlight his sinful condition and need, not for more wealth or possessions, but for a Savior.

In our text, Jesus now turns to His disciples. He says, "How difficult it will be for those who have wealth to enter the Kingdom of God!" Mark tells us that the disciples were amazed by this – they were overwhelmed. Why? Because they thought that riches were a blessing from God! Just like many people today, the disciples and the Jewish people of the time believed in a type of prosperity Gospel – that riches and possessions and wealth was a sign of God's favor. To the Jewish mind in Jesus' time, it was inconceivable that riches could actually be a barrier to the kingdom of God! Today, we need to be careful lest we believe that any type of economic prosperity to be a certain sign of God's favor or election.

Instead, we need to hear Jesus' words and hear them carefully. Wealth, and certainly not wealth that is earned in a God pleasing way, is not sinful, but it can be a serious handicap or danger. And this is not just the wealth of the super rich. Most of us know that according to historical standards around the world, even poor in America today could be considered as having wealth. And after the disciples were amazed by Jesus' first saying, He broadens it out to include everyone by saying, "Children, how difficult it is to enter the Kingdom of God!" But Jesus does go on to say that it is easier for a camel, (the largest animal in Palestine) to go through the eye of the needle (that is, the smallest of openings) than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.

So, what are the disadvantages or dangers of wealth and prosperity? Well, for one thing, they can destroy our morals and values. It has been said that the wealthy are tempted to know the price of everything and the value of nothing. This means that we can become so attached to the stuff of this world that we loose focus on the things that count the most – primarily our relationship with God and our neighbors.

Loosing this focus on God and those around us, along with a belief that wealth is a sign of God's favor, also puts our souls in danger - as we risk losing the one thing required for entering the kingdom of God – a helpless, dependent faith in Christ as our Savior! How often do we see even children, who have just a little bit of money in their pocket, think they don't need anyone anymore. Clinging to a handful of coins they'll say, "I'll go buy this pack of bubble gum all by myself."

Now knowing this sinful danger, the disciples are exceedingly astonished, asking "Then who can be saved?" To which Jesus responds, "With man it is impossible, but not with God. For all things are possible with God."

"All things are possible with God". Far too often we apply these words of our Lord in frivolous or relatively unimportant matters. But Jesus tells His disciples this so that they may know that they are saved. And this is not from their own works or prosperity, despite what the world may say. But this deliverance from sin and every evil comes through their faith in Him as their Lord and Savior.

This salvation was won for all who call on Jesus' name through the most impossible of situations – Jesus' death and resurrection. He gave up all the riches of heaven to place Himself under the law and keep it perfectly. Yet He still paid the price for sin – dying, not for His however, but for ours. And having been raised from the dead, Jesus shows us that we, as sinners, have been forgiven and have life in His name. The Son of God rising from the grave to give sinners life proves that nothing, even our salvation, is impossible with God!

This text from the Gospel of Mark is not really about wealth. Rather, here Jesus is really talking about hope. The hope that we have for salvation. And that hope does not rest in our possessions or how wealthy we are. Rather, the hope for all people, rich and poor alike, is Jesus Christ. So let us drop any possession or love for anything that would hinder our faith and trust in Him. For with Him, all things are possible. Amen.
